# **Annual Age of Champions Event Growing Success!**

This year, CACL hosted the <u>5th Annual UNH Age of Champions event</u> on April 22nd. The event brought together community members, UNH faculty and students, and a variety of stakeholders dedicated to optimizing the experience of older adulthood and empowering older adults to remain engaged, active, and healthy. Centered around the award winning

documentary <u>Age of Champions</u>, this year's event truly embodied the spirit of the film and the new event tag line, "Celebrating Longevity." The event was enjoyed by all ages, from children to college aged students to older adults, who came to learn more about the dividends of aging. <u>Stan Davis</u> set



the tone of the event with poignant and humorous music about the experience of growing older. Three <u>UNH Wildcat Inspiration Awards</u> were given out to Jim and Carly Hellen from Durham, NH; Jack and June Liberman from Newport, NH; and Jack Sherburne from Deerfield, NH. Participants participated in activities like pickle ball and Tai Chi. Resources were also available including student and community-based organizations running booths providing health information such as falls prevention, accessibility resources, adaptive equipment, and healthy eating.

### STAFF HIGHLIGHT

Alison Rataj, Research Associate

Alison Rataj, MSW, joined CACL in October of 2014. She has worked on multiple large scale federal grants through contracts with NH DHHS including the Balancing Incentive Program and the Aging and Disability Resource Center Program. Her more recent work has revolved around the Alliance for Healthy Aging (NH AHA), which seeks to create communities in NH that advance culture, policies, and services to support older adults and their families. Within this project, Alison provides measurement, evaluation, research, and workgroup support. This summer Alison will begin working on a <u>new CACL funded project</u> that supports the development of agefriendly advocates through the NH Senior Leadership Alumni Network. Alison is also a planning committee member for the UNH Age of Champions event, which promotes healthy active aging.



Alison is an adjunct professor in the UNH Social Work department, currently teaching a master's level course: "Human Behavior in the Macro Social Environment II", and is co-teaching with Marguerite Corvini an undergraduate course: "You've Got Your Troubles, I've Got Mine: A course on grief and loss" in Spring 2018. Along with her UNH Social Work colleagues, Alison has

published two articles, and has one article under review. She wrapped up her interdisciplinary research with the Occupational Therapy Department, Social Work Department, and CACL in the spring of 2017 through the CHHS Aging and Research Affinity Group. This group has focused on the use of information technology, like iPads, for older adults and caregivers of people living with Alzheimer's Disease and is embarking on a research a project looking at social and health service utilization among low-income elders in subsidized senior housing. Alison also sits on the NH National Association of Social Workers (NH-NASW) board, and chairs the NH-NASW Aging committee.

In the future, Alison plans to continue her work at CACL to develop and implement systems change related to aging. #### CACL Awarded Grant to Support Senior Leadership Advocacy Efforts

In July, CACL was awarded a two-year grant in the amount of \$185,311 from the <u>Tufts</u> <u>Health Plan Foundation</u> to support the development of advocates for older adults through the NH Senior Leadership Alumni Network (SLAN). The project is a collaboration with AARP NH and the Dartmouth Centers for Health and Aging. Building on the Senior Leadership Series, SLAN will further develop a grassroots effort for Series alumni to engage in an advocacy network. Additional goals of the project include inviting alumni to help develop and leverage the upcoming 2018 Senior Leadership Series, and building the alumni network's at both a local and state level. CACL Staff Assist with Medicaid Training for New England States

CACL staff members Laura Davie and Kate Crary joined University of Massachusetts and University of Maine in the development and delivery of a two-day learning collaborative-style training on different aspects of Medicaid's Long Term Services and Supports through the New England States Consortium Systems Organization's (NESCSO).



Laura and Kate's curriculum focused on Service Delivery within LTSS, personcentered practices, and how the social determinants of health impact the individual receiving care. Kate also provided graphic recording during the two-day session to



increase engagement, retention of ideas, and to facilitate decision making. Attendees came from New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island, and representatives from the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services were also in attendance. The training was well received, and CACL looks forward to

continuing their relationship with NESCSO moving forward.
